Highlights

● **Syria:** In March, IOM reached around 30,800 IDPs and conflict-affected populations in Al Hole (western Homs) and Big Orem (western Aleppo) through inter-agency convoys with health and non-food items. Through its hub in Jordan, in response to the urgent need of humanitarian assistance for IDPs in Sheikh Miskeen, IOM distributed 2,410 sleeping bags on 5 March.

● **Lebanon:** On 23 March, IOM conducted a training on 'Tuberculosis (TB) Screening in Prisons' for National Tuberculosis Programme (NTP) staff operating at the different NTP centres in Lebanon. The training was provided by the NTP manager in collaboration with a health consultant from the Ministry of Public Health (MoPH).

● **Iraq:** Since the beginning of the Syrian Crisis, IOM has provided transportation to over 100,000 refugees from border areas to camps and to access essential services, provided NFIs to over a quarter million beneficiaries, and livelihood support for over 5,000 beneficiaries.

● **Jordan:** In March, there was an increase in the number of vulnerable refugees admitted per day (80 – 100 individuals), compared to an average of 73 refugees per day in February. During the reporting period, IOM provided 3,084 refugees with transportation assistance from Raba'a Al Sarhan transit centre to Za'atari and Azraq camps.


● **Turkey:** Throughout March, IOM assisted 55 vulnerable cases (187 beneficiaries) requiring specialized assistance and protection. In 2016, IOM has assisted a total of 91 cases (298 beneficiaries). Majority of cases are those with medical needs or are in need of accommodation or rental assistance. The team receives referrals from UN agencies, NGOs, government authorities as well as IOM field teams.

● **Egypt:** In celebration of International Women's Day, IOM distributed dignity kits to Syrian women, provided a 10-minute medical briefing on the need for Pap smear tests and mammograms, and offered them the opportunity to be screened for cervical and breast cancer at one of Cairo's medical health care providers.





Winterization and Health Activities

On 24 March, IOM reached the crossline area of Al-Hole in western Homs countryside through an inter-agency convoy with contributions of health and non-food items. A total of 4,800 individuals will benefit from the medical items (including mercurial sphygmomanometers along with stethoscope, personal diabetes analysis devices, and mercurial thermometers), and 14,985 IDPs will receive NFIs (including 1,000 winter clothing kits, 1,000 plastic mats, 3,000 high thermal blankets, and 2,000 mattresses). Furthermore, during the reporting period, IOM reached the crossline area Big Orem in the western countryside of Aleppo through another inter-agency convoy. IOM's assistance provided 11,000 beneficiaries with winterization items including 2,200 winter clothing kits, 1,000 plastic mats, 2,000 high thermal blankets, and 2,000 mattresses.

Through Their Eyes

Maha, 44, was living with her husband and daughter in Dier-ez-Zor before the conflict. The family was first displaced to Homs after the armed conflict erupted. Maha's husband went missing in 2014 as the area they lived in became unsafe. Maha and her daughter were displaced again to her sister's house in Hama. Unfortunately, Maha's sister's house was too small to accommodate both families, and after a few months, Maha and her daughter moved out.

Maha now lives in an unfinished room with her daughter, sharing the space with another displaced family (Hana and her father who were displaced from Al-Rastan). On 31 March, IOM and its local partner provided Maha and Hana with sealing-off kits (SOK) to improve their living conditions and provide more privacy for the families.

Tuberculosis (TB) Screening in Prisons

On 23 March, IOM facilitated a training on 'TB Screening in Prisons' for 22 NTP staff operating at the different NTP centres in Lebanon. The training was provided by the NTP manager in collaboration with a health consultant from MoPH. Some of the objectives from this training included:

- Adapt and implement the internationally recommended Stop TB strategy in prisons.
- Ensure a continuum of care for released prisoners of all nationalities who are on treatment for TB and for individuals who are on treatment before entering the penitentiary system.
- Conduct screening of new inmates and periodic screening of prisoners and penitentiary services staff to detect active TB in a timely manner.
- Monitor the TB situation in the prisons, including recording and reporting of TB and other communicable diseases for prison population and linking the information to the national health surveillance system.
- Strengthen TB control in penitentiary-based programmes by raising awareness about TB among inmates, and medical and non-medical staff.

Through Their Eyes

Jihad Ali Salloub, a 41-year old husband and father of two, is a Lebanese citizen from Adloun Village, South Lebanon.

Jihad was an owner of a small restaurant until July 2012 when he was injured by a landmine explosion resulting in the amputation of his hand in addition to other injuries. In order to cover his treatment and medical expenses, Jihad had to sell his restaurant.

After the accident, he was not able to find employment and was left jobless for three years. In 2015, Jihad applied to IOM's livelihood community support programme in his village. "I finally have the chance to feel like I'm a part of society and be independent. I am glad to participate in such a programme in which all my neighbours can see what I am capable of. And now with the money I earn, I am able to continue paying off my debts and medication fees. Besides that, I bought fishing equipment so I can fish and earn some money to support my family".

Jihad is working in the livelihoods programme and was recently assigned by the municipality to supervise the activities carried out by the beneficiaries. Moreover, due to his work as a fisherman he can now actively support himself and his family.

Vocational Training and Livelihood Support

Construction works for Darutu market place in Erbil which started in November 2015 are close to completion. Once completed, the market will host 60 shops benefitting Syrian refugees, IDPs, and host community members.

Through Their Eyes

As the sound of bombings came close to his hometown of Qamishli in northern Syria, Ahmed feared for his family. Ahmed's wife quickly packed a bag and then, holding the hands of their three children, they began walking towards the Iraqi border to cross the Peshkhabur River into the Kurdistan Region. Since August 2013, the family has lived at Kawer Gosik Camp for Syrian refugees near Erbil City. Despite his skills as an electrician, Ahmed found very few job opportunities at the camp and due to the lack of affordable transportation; it was difficult to work elsewhere.

In October 2015, IOM distributed 10 motorbikes funded by Japan to help some of the most vulnerable families improve their livelihoods; one was jointly received by Ahmed and another Syrian refugee, Asaad, also an electrician. The two men have been using the motorbike ever since to enhance their opportunities and to save desperately needed money.

Ahmed said: "We work together as electricians; we share the motorbike and equally divide our earnings. The motorbike is a great help. It expands our reach to nearby villages and it reduces the cost of transporting our ladder and equipment. For example, if we earned IQD 50,000 (approx. USD 45) from one job, we would pay up to IQD 15,000 (USD 14) in transportation fees and this is a lot for us. Now we only spend IQD 5,000 (USD 5) on gas and oil for the motorbike. This is a lot of money saved. I really thank IOM and Japan for giving us this motorbike."

Alia Hassana is a Jordanian employed with IOM as a nurse working in Za'atari camp. She has worked in Za'atari for the past three years, providing vaccinations to children and women. Prior to working with IOM, Alia worked outside the camp with the Ministry of Health for 23 years.

When asked about problems she faces in her work, Alia responded that one of the primary challenges she faces at her job in Za'atari is electricity cuts; this is especially a problem since vaccines need to be kept at a cooler temperature. However, she said that with the addition of a refrigerator powered by solar energy provided by UNICEF, they are now able to keep vaccines at the proper temperature.

Alia hopes that Syrian refugees will be able to return to their homes someday, but until then, she will continue to provide much needed vaccination services for them.

World Tuberculosis Day

24 March marks World Tuberculosis Day. The purpose of this day is to raise public awareness on this prevalent and potentially fatal disease which continues to affect millions of people every year.

For World Tuberculosis Day, IOM's health team prepared awareness items on tuberculosis (TB) including: T-shirts, posters, and brochures with the theme message of this year, "Unite to End TB". On 24 March, IOM staff, as well as volunteers, distributed these items to camps and urban areas. Additionally, the medical team raised awareness on TB and conducted screenings for migrant workers at a garment factory in Irbid.



School Transportation

In March, IOM transported 4,684 school children daily to access education. The children are provided with transportation to attend six schools in Adana (2), Sanliurfa (2), Batman (1), and Malatya (1). According to the school head in Batman, since the transportation project began, enrolment at the school has increased. IOM is looking to expanding the capacity of the transportation services in Batman for the new school year which starts in September.

Furthermore, during March, IOM provided training for 61 bus drivers on child protection, Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) and the general rules and regulations on vehicle use and maintenance. The training will continue in April until all drivers have undertaken it.

Sanliurfa and Hatay NFIs/Winterization

In Sanliurfa, IOM assisted over 2,500 households (13,576 persons) during the reporting period with non-food items and hygiene kits. The hygiene kits were distributed by IOM's implementing partner, International Blue Crescent. Areas targeted included Suruc and Akcakale districts, as well as Sanliurfa town centre.

In Hatay, IOM continued to provide NFIs such as blankets, mattresses and carpets to vulnerable households in Kirikhan and Kumlu, 302 households (1,603 individuals) benefitted from this assistance. An additional 417 households (2,058 persons) received hygiene kits, and a further 65 households (411 persons) received winterization items; these were newly arrived families that did not have any heating sources and lived in deplorable conditions.

Additionally, IOM supported the temporary camp in Güveççi village (in Yaylada district) of Hatay with 45,000 litres of water as well as hygiene items to Syrians living there. A total of 2,614 people benefitted.

International Women's Day

Throughout March, IOM distributed 200 vouchers for Syrian women to undergo Pap smear tests that detect potentially pre-cancerous and cancerous cells in the cervix, as well as mammography exams for the early detection of breast cancer. Women aged 21 and above were eligible for the Pap smear test, whereas the mammograms were advised for women 40 years old and above or for women with a family history of cancer.

Female migrants approaching IOM or a selected IOM partner organization received a dignity kit and attended a 10-minute medical briefing on the need for Pap smear tests and mammograms. Interested migrants were then referred to a health care provider and encouraged to approach IOM should the results of their medical exams require follow-up.

Promoting Social Cohesion

'It's a Match!', a click-funding campaign promoting social cohesion among migrants and their host communities in Egypt initiated by IOM in partnership with award-winning innovators Bassita, has gone viral and reached its target in less than two weeks.

The campaign uses gamification to promote mutual understanding and cooperation between Syrians and their Egyptian host communities in order to break down social barriers in one of Cairo's outer neighbourhoods. It also aims to create a positive economic impact through injecting liquidity and stimulating demand for the neighbourhood's local businesses.

The campaign provided 1,000 halved coupons to 500 Syrians and 500 Egyptians. Egyptian participants had to find their "match" in a migrant counterpart, be introduced and take a selfie together in order to be able to redeem the coupons. The project was made possible with the generous support of the US State Department's Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration (PRM).

"Thoraya moved to the neighbourhood a few years ago when violence surged in Syria. We have been neighbours for the past 3 years. We used to greet each other whenever our paths crossed. 'It's a Match!' encouraged us to actually start a conversation and exchange phone numbers. We loved the idea and we have met twice since then so that our kids can play together," said one of the Egyptian beneficiaries.

The campaign is part of a more extensive programme falling under the Regional Refugee and Resilience Plan for Syria (3RP), which also aims to provide social assistance to Syrians and host communities in order to improve living conditions, resilience, and social cohesion, and ultimately to prevent irregular and unsafe migration.

The campaign, which seeks to bring together Egyptians and migrants, successfully distributed 1,000 coupons in two days.
